CAPO UPDATE

Update Proposed Face to Face Engagement Session planned for early 2022

Engagements will be focussed on the 17 Socio-economic outcomes and informed by the outcomes of engagements conducted on the five Priority Reforms for NSW (the Priority Reforms in the National Agreement and the NSW specific priority on Employment, Business growth and Economic prosperity). Annual General Meeting

Training

This year our staff attended the LETS WALK TOGETHER, LETS TALK TOGETHER two-day symposium where they shared a culturally safe space for open discussion on suicide and the ripple effect experienced by Aboriginal communities.

The event covered suicide prevention, intervention and postvention strategies. Staff got the opportunity to hear from Aboriginal people who have been affected by suicide, as well as be part of a community forum and collective artwork, where the participants got to share knowledge and connect with others who are working in the sector.

Redress

Territories Stolen Generations Redress Scheme

The Australian Government is investing \$378.6 million over five years for a financial and wellbeing package for Stolen Generations survivors who were removed as children from their families in the Northern Territory or the Australian Capital Territory prior to their respective self-government, or the Jervis Bay Territory (collectively known as the territories). The package, known as the **Territories Stolen Generations Redress Scheme**, will be administered by the National Indigenous Australians Agency (NIAA).

The Scheme, operating from 1 March 2022 to 30 June 2026, will:

- Make payments in recognition of the harm caused by forced removal from family for Stolen Generations survivors.
- Assist with the healing of this trauma for the Stolen Generations survivors who were forcibly removed in the territories.
- Help survivors gain access to counselling and support services and a face-toface or written direct personal response.

Eligibility

To be eligible for the Scheme, potential applicants must be:

- an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander person
- under the age of 18 years at the time they were removed from their family by government bodies (including the police), churches/missions and/or welfare bodies, and in circumstances where their indigeneity was a factor in their removal, and
- removed whilst living in the Northern Territory or the Australian Capital Territory prior to their respective self-government, or the Jervis Bay Territory.

If an eligible Stolen Generations member passes away between 5 August 2021 and 1 March 2022, their family will be able to submit an application on their behalf.

Redress

The Scheme will enable eligible applicants to access:

- A one-off payment of **\$75,000** in recognition of the harm caused by the forced removal.
- A one-off healing assistance payment of **\$7,000** in recognition that the action to facilitate healing is specific to each individual.
- The opportunity for each survivor to confidentially tell their story about the impact of their removal to a senior official within government, have their story acknowledged and receive a face-to-face or written direct personal response.

Applications can be made from 1 March 2022

- Online applications will be encouraged.
- Paper applications will be made available for those who don't have the means or ability to submit online.

Scheme funded support services will be available during and after the application process. They will provide free and confidential, practical and emotional support, free legal advice, and free financial counselling.

Further details will be announced closer to applications opening next year regarding other agencies.






Reunions

This year has been a difficult year for Link-Up (NSW) clients and the reunification team. The COVID-19 pandemic has seen Link-Up (NSW) postpone several reunions until 2022, however we have strategised and decided on bringing families together through virtual reunions conducted over Zoom. Virtual reunions were designed not to replace the physical reunions, but enhance the experience. It was designed to provide initial contact between clients and their families, and to also give those clients who are already in contact with their families the opportunity to have input into the awaiting reunion. In the last few months Link-Up (NSW) have been able to facilitate ten (10) virtual reunions, bringing together brothers, sisters, nieces, nephews, and inlaws. It has allowed the families to start building relationships that will hopefully get stronger on the face-to-face reunions and ensure continued growth within those relationships. The Reunification team have been working hard on client reunion proposals and look forward to the physical reunions we have planned for the new year.



Research



On a recent trip to Moree, researcher Gill was able to obtain some of the last available copies of the now out-of-Courthouse Death Records print series by Lola Cormie. These books are extremely comprehensive. Entries in them include most of the fields that are normally listed on a NSW BDM Death Certificate - thus saving having to send to BDMs for details or certificates for deaths in the following three towns: (1) Moree (2) Narrabri and (3) Brewarrina. In some cases entries in the books actually include even more than what you would find on a BDM Death Certificate - being cross-referenced with details of other family members who have passed away in the same town and where they are buried.

Additionally, Gill visited local libraries and obtained resources from them that will add to Link-Up's reference collection. Inverell Shire Library was particularly generous and has donated a number of publications that are relevant to Nulcoorlima. Anaiwan and Gomeroi histories of the area. A digital copy of the rare book the Five Black "Ingelba and Matriarchs" by Patsy Cohen and Margaret Somerville was obtained for Link-Up (NSW) from Armidale Library by the librarians at Inverell Shire Library. Big thank you to Program Manager Jodie Matthews for sparking the curiosity to go out and track down these rare records and resources.

Presentation with All Stars Womens Training Squad



Magical Moments



About 3 years ago, Link-Up (SA) contacted Link-Up (NSW) in regards to supporting a woman that was in NSW so she was able to meet her son in South Australia. This woman had given birth to what she thought was a still born (as that was what the Dr's had told her) however, he was alive.

Link-Up (NSW) counsellor, Mary-Anne contacted the woman to introduce herself. The women stated "I got a phone call from a man stating he was my child, and I am finding it hard to get my head around the situation".

Emotionally, she was a mess; which was understandable due to the trauma she had encountered. Mary-Anne set up regular phone sessions for a few weeks so the client could unpack what she had been though, and come to terms with what had happened. This support was given so when it came time to meeting her birth son, she could potentially form a bond with him and have an ongoing relationship. After 2 months of counselling, it was time for the reunion.

Day 1 of meeting the birth son: The son had a good understanding about human behaviour and emotions, so when he finally met his mother, he knew to take his time and ask the right questions. The first moment he saw his Mother, he greeted her at the gate of the airport and asked if it was OK to hug her.

He then allowed her to talk and waited for her to ask questions about him and his family. The son had not have the best upbringing with his adoptive parents, however it was was too much to tell her on the first day of reuniting, so he told her the good things of his adulthood while they sat across from each other.

Day 2 was more sit downs and yarns again, with this time the birth son asking if it was OK to sit next to her. The Mother moved over and allowed her son to sit close by and talk. It was amazing witnessing the distance between the two slowly disappear.

MAGICAL MOMENTS CONTINUED



Day 3 the birth son asked his Mother if she was comfortable enough to allow the Link-Up (NSW) staff to leave so they could spend some time together on their town. The Mother agreed, so the staff left them alone for 2 hours.

When the staff eventually came back, the Mother gushed saying how amazing it was and that she feels as though her and her son have formed a bond, a strong one at that.

It was at this point the son turned to his Mother and said "for 57 years I wanted to meet you. For 57 years I wanted to give you a Mothers Day present" as he was saying this, he pulled out a gift. The Mother opened it in front of the staff. It was a tea set. She looked over to her son and said "how did you know I like tea?" to which he replied "Mum I have listened to every single word you have said. You told me you collect tea pots and cups on the day we first met and I remebered"

At this magical moment, there was not a dry eye in the room.
