ERICK TALBOT REUNION

MOREE, NEW SOUTH WALES



Erick Talbot's with Link-Up [NSW] began in 2021 when Erick's Aunt Michelle was reunited to Country in Moree, New South Wales. In July 2022, Erick's Mother was also reunited to Country at a gravesite reunion and a visit to the old mission where her maternal Grandparents lived and raised their children. Unfortunately, due to contracting COVID, Erick was not able to attend this reunion in July 2022 and therefore it was decided by Link-Up [NSW] to allow Erick to attend a duplicate reunion which was held on February 4 to February 6, 2025.

Erick's reunion was held over three days and started with a Welcome to Country and Smoking Ceremony held by Uncle Lloyd Munro and Brother Paul at the Moree Cemetery where Erick placed native flower arrangements at the resting place of both his maternal Great Grandparents Alf and Annie Haynes.

The following day, Link-Up [NSW] staff took Erick on a road trip with Brother Paul to Mungindi Mission and Boomi, as well as a visit with Elders from the Mungindi Local Aboriginal Council.

Whilst at Mungindi Mission, Erick sat with the local Elders' and Brother Paul around a yarning circle and listened to their stories about the past as well as their hopes for the future. They expressed their hopes of the Mission becoming a place of cultural significance where mob can meet, celebrate and reflect.

Brother Paul shared language with Erick as well as his knowledge about local Aboriginal history. Erick really appreciated this opportunity and expressed how much Brother Paul's generosity as well as the other Elders' who attended his reunion had meant to him.

Erick stated his plans were to return to Moree in the future to continue his healing journey. He mentioned his intentions of returning with his family and desire to speak with his cousins about putting a headstone on their ancestor's plot which he had been shown.













REDRESS:



NATIONAL REDRESS SCHEME

The National Redress Scheme (NRS) was recommended by the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. It was set up to acknowledge the harm done to people who have experienced child sexual abuse while in care.

The NRS can provide three things:

- counselling for those who were sexually abused in Australian institutions
- · a personal response or apology
- a Redress payment

TERRITORIES STOLEN GENERATIONS REDRESS SCHEME

The Territories Stolen Generations Redress Scheme provides support to Stolen Generations survivors who were removed from their families or communities, and whose removal took place in the:

- Northern Territory, before 1 July 1978 or
- Australian Capital Territory, before 11 May 1989 or
- · Jervis Bay Territory.

NATIONAL REDRESS UPDATE:

The Redress counsellor and Caseworker attended several RSS workshops in different regions, including Fairfield and Albury/Wodonga in New South Wales. They also participated in several important meetings including NSW/ACT Redress Support Services (RSS) Community of Practice Meeting, NSW/ACT Redress Support Services Network Meeting, ACT/NSW Bimonthly Meeting and the National Redress Scheme DSS Bi-Monthly.

Additionally, outreach efforts were made in areas such as the Central Coast, Far Western regions, Armidale, and Port Macquarie to connect with individuals and groups who may need assistance or information regarding Redress Support Services.



TERRITORIES REDRESS UPDATE:

Link-Up [NSW] Aboriginal Corporation's Redress Caseworker, Stephen Fields and Territories Redress Caseworker, Robert Leslie visited the Armidale Aboriginal Cultural Centre, where they met with Director Rosie Lovelock. Rosie explained her work connecting Aboriginal people in the area to their families and showed them two books that help individuals trace their family histories.

Upon learning that Link-Up [NSW] shares this key role, Rosie expressed interest in collaborating with them to assist each other. During the visit, they also learned about a program helping young people identify their connections to tribes and totems.

Robert Leslie suggested adapting this program for a men's group in Penrith, and Aboriginal Elder Bob Blair, who was present, agreed.



YOUTH AND COMMUNITY:



FAMILY LINK UPDATES:

The Family Link Program assist Aboriginal youth and children that are at risk of entering or already within Out-of-home-care (OOHC) statewide (NSW). Dedicated research provides Kinship, Family Contact and Cultural information linking them to families, country, and community, ensuring a sense of social, emotional, and physical well-being.

Link-Up [NSW] works closely with Birth Deaths and Marriages NSW (BDM NSW), Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies (AIATSIS) and other peak research bodies.

TARGETTED EARLY INTERVENTION:

Coordinator to build links with Aboriginal Families, Children, young people, and communities to have access to culturally safe support and services to promote culture, strong communities, and self-determination.

FAMILY LINK UPDATE:

Through collaboration with various partners, including the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ), Non-Government
Organisations (NGOs), and Aboriginal
Community Controlled Organisations
(ACCOs), the Family Link team has seen a steady flow of referrals. To date, the team has successfully completed family history research for 30 young individuals. With an average of 16 referrals per month, it is evident that the demand for these services is high, highlighting the importance of this work in the lives of young people in care.

The Family Link team is comprised of a dedicated group of six researchers who work tirelessly to track down family histories and





ensure that all family lines are researched thoroughly. They utilise a variety of resources to gather information, including web pages, external organisations, books, and registers.

The research conducted by the Family Link team is not just about finding names and dates; it's about providing young people with the knowledge that helps them feel seen, heard, and valued.

TARGETTED EARLY INTERVENTION

As the new Targeted Early Intervention (TEI) caseworker, Vickie Mason brings a wealth of knowledge and skills from her background in education, health, and the community sectors. Her expertise uniquely positions her to make a significant impact in the lives of individuals and families in Western Sydney, an area known for its cultural diversity and socioeconomic challenges.

Targeted early intervention is about identifying potential issues early on and providing the right support to prevent those challenges from escalating. With her experience, Vickie is well-equipped to recognise early signs of difficulties in children, families, and communities. Her understanding of the local Western Sydney community and the community sector enables her to engage with local services and resources to offer holistic support and deliver effective interventions.

The knowledge that Vickie holds will help her tailor interventions that are culturally sensitive and relevant, ensuring they meet the specific needs of the community to strengthen families in Western Sydney, ultimately promoting better outcomes for children and young people.

Over the weekend of February 14–17, 2025, Link-Up [NSW] Aboriginal Corporation hosted a meaningful retreat on Dharug land at Wisemans Ferry for Stolen Generations survivors who were invited to share their personal stories about their experiences as part of The Stolen Generation. These stories were captured and documented by the talented team at Earthstar Productions as part of the Link-Up [NSW] documentary.

This documentary will not only serve as a tool for healing, but will also be used for educational purposes, offering valuable insights into the experiences of the Stolen Generations and the impact of past government policies. It will provide a firsthand account of how these policies affected the Stolen Generation survivors, families and communities.

In addition to the filming of the documentary, all attendees were Welcomed on Dharug country, which included a Welcome Dance and Smoking Ceremony, by Djirabitty Dancers. Attendees also enjoyed the soothing music of Edgar Conlon, who travelled from Queensland specifically to honour the late Uncle Archie Roach with a beautiful acoustic rendition of his song "Took the Children Away" and candle and scented room spray making which was facilitated by Aunty Sylvia Barramarrany.

LINK-UP [NSW] ABORIGINAL CORPORATION: ANNIVERSARY OF THE NATIONAL APOLOGY EVENT

Kevin Rudd's National Apology to the Stolen Generations was delivered on February 13, 2008. In this apology, the then Prime Minister expressed deep regret on behalf of the Australian government for the policies and actions that led to the forced removal of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children from their families.

Kevin Rudd's National Apology was a moment in the history of this country that served to acknowledge the injustice done to the Stolen Generations, promote healing, and encourage reconciliation.

Link-Up [NSW] Aboriginal Corporation hosted our annual National Apology Anniversary Event, this year taking the event to Mount Druitt Community Hall on February 13, 2025. The event allowed us to come together with the local community and organisations to watch Kevin Rudd's National Apology to the Stolen Generations and mourn the effects of past Government policies.

The day began at 10:00 AM with a powerful Welcome to Country by Rhiannon Wright, followed by a Smoking Ceremony led by Jessy McKinless. Our CEO, Max Duncan, along with Will Cooper from the Healing Foundation, spoke meaningfully to the community before the Yangkay Cultural Connect Dancers took to the stage.



Following the meaningful speeches and performances, a replay Kevin Rudd's apology was shown for all attendees of the event. This served as a moment for everyone to pay their respects to the Stolen Generations and reflect on the pain and suffering that was caused.

The event was once again a meaningful and successful gathering for all involved, concluding with a BBQ lunch allowing for the Mt Druitt community to come together.

It was an excellent opportunity to engage with the community and local organisations.






INTERNATIONAL WOMAN'S DAY MORNING TEA
